Soul Journey to Holden Village

The evening of Monday, June 17, 18 Grace "Soul Journeyers" will journey from Phoenix to Holden Village in central Washington State. In the process, we will take the following modes of transportation: lightrail, planes, cars, buses, and a boat. It will indeed be a journey! Then, we will make our temporary home at Holden Village, a Lutheran renewal center in the Cascade Mountains. Originally a copper mining community, Holden Village was gifted to the Lutheran Church over 50 years ago. Today, Holden welcomes hundreds of guests each summer week, powered by the efforts of approximately 1,000 volunteers annually along with 20 employees. A small number of year-round employees and long-term volunteers live in the village through the winter months. a community of about 50-75 people. To that end, the village includes a pastor on the roster of either the ELCA or LCMS, a Chelan school district teacher who teaches all the children of the village, directors, an accountant, a mechanic, program staff, and other administrative and technical staff. The vision of Holden Village is the love of God making new the church and world through the cross of Jesus Christ. The mission of Holden Village, a Lutheran ministry, is to welcome all people into the wilderness to be called, equipped and sent by God as we share rhythms of Word and Sacrament; work, recreation, and study; intercession and healing.

In our week of travel, the Grace Soul Journeyers will embrace our mission which is to grow spiritually, be challenged to live simply, and build relationships among our co-journeyers and Villagers. In the months leading up to the trip, we have met monthly to serve the Grace community and build relationships with one another. Once we depart from Sky Harbor airport, we will be challenged to trust one another and work together as we journey to a new place and into a different way of life. Life at Holden Village is slower, less frenzied, and more intentional than most of the places at which we work and play, go to school and live. During our time at Holden, we will have no cell phone service or internet. We will eat meat only twice a week, and all of our meals will be made in-house. No processed food is served at Holden, not even packaged granola bars or other snack items. We will hike regularly and thus challenge our bodies to overcome physical barriers.

We will worship each evening with the entire Holden Village community; even guests must agree to daily worship attendance to stay at the village. We will become aware of our trash by serving with the village "garbologist;" because the village must send out their trash by boat, they strictly sort all of the trash in village into the following categories: compost, recycle, burn, and landfill. Holden invites volunteers and guests into a variety of small practices that limit energy use and build community among all the various strangers who converge on this Lutheran community each summer.

The summer of 2004, Ben and I volunteered full-time at Holden for 12 weeks. Ben served in the kitchen; I managed the Dining Room and Dining Room volunteers. When we returned to the Chicago at the end of the summer, we began composting and drastically reduced our trash. 15 years ago, we had no cell phones, wifi, or TV anyway, but we both enjoyed the time away from noise pollution, air pollution, and light pollution. We continued connections from our time at Holden into the years that followed. My hope for the Grace Soul Journeyers is that each person will take away something from our trip that will enrich their spiritual lives, their care for Earth, and their relationships with one another. Spending time at Holden Village reminds us, in the midst of a busy, chaotic world, that the kind of life we lead here in Phoenix is not the only way life can be led. Truly, we can live deeply attuned to God's presence. We can live lightly on Earth. We can care for one another and even strangers.

2019 Heat Respite Coordinator

Clottee A. Hammons grew up in the segregated downtown Phoenix area and is the granddaughter of a 10th Calvary Buffalo Soldier. She views that legacy with pride and a strong sense of social responsibility.

Ms. Hammons' organization Emancipation Arts resides at Phoenix Center for the Arts. She is a Visual Artist, Curator, Writer, Poet, Activist, Educator and Prevention Specialist.

Emancipation Arts motto: "I promise you will learn what schools will not teach."

She views her special call as a "community builder" and works in grateful collaboration with numerous artists, organizations and individuals while being conscientious and mindful of honoring her ancestors. She organized the Hub Artists Collective and served on the Artlink Board of Directors. Ms. Hammons taught Art Theory and techniques to students [K - 8], differently abled students as well as seniors. She also provided a focused arts program to women in a domestic violence shelter environment.

In addition to teaching Art, Ms. Hammons provides educations and information to groups and individuals about prevention and harm reduction approaches to HIV/AIDS, STIs, substance dependence, poverty and homelessness. Ms. Hammons is a phlebotomist that has conducted hundreds of HIV tests and provided counseling. She is currently revising an edition of a comprehensive course and syllabus for presentations to young people about sexual awareness and perceptions.

Ms. Hammons is passionate about literature, history, libraries and librarians. She is the creator and ongoing facilitator of the Emancipation Marathon; which is a literary tradition that honors the victims of American Chattel Slavery. The Emancipation Marathon will celebrate twenty two seasons in June 2019. The Bona Fide Blues Review CD will be released January 19th and is a facet of the multidisciplinary Great Migration –Indiscernibles in Arizona project; which will be on exhibition at Arizona State University School of Human Evolution and Social Change.

She is the co-creator and facilitator of The Inspired Truth Series which are readings: community conversations, inspired by literature which is read publicly during the Emancipation Marathon. Ms. Hammons was the recipient of an Arizona Humanities Council grant [supported by the NEH & ALA] which brought the national "Making Sense of the Civil War" program to Phoenix. She has also been the recipient of a grant from the Cultural Arts Coalition.

I have been a fan of the Heat Respite Program at Grace Lutheran Church for many years and I am now excited to have the opportunity to participate. The iconic "Hierarchy of Needs" (Love & Delongingness, Safety, Esteem and Self-Actualization) can be realized under one air conditioned roof!

"Live into the Discomfort"

On our long car ride home from the March YAGM retreat, we played a game where we had to come up with a "tagline" for each person in the YAGM cohort. It was decided that mine would be "live into the discomfort." Little did I realize how much I use this phrase in my conversations here in Senegal, particularly when encouraging the YAGM to stay present, to take another look, and engage again in a difficult situation, relationship, or unjust system.

I remember telling Rachel to "live into the discomfort" when she worried that she was too much of a burden on her host family and they were too generous with what she had deemed insufficient resources.

I remember telling Andrew that I wasn't going to answer his questions of the right way to be a YAGM because he needed to muddle through the discomfort of living out the answer.

And I have to tell myself to "live into the discomfort" when, upon returning from my trip to the US in April, friends and colleagues ask me where their present is; and I have to remember the privilege I have to travel and to be able to share with others. And most discomforting of all, since it is the cultural norm in Senegal for someone who has travelled to bring presents back for everyone, the honor of being invited to live into the often awkward-forme cultural norms of Senegal by my friends and colleagues.

Discomfort, which I'm not even sure if a word, is a way of life for the Senegal YAGM and for myself. I've come to believe that living into the discomfort is good practice for living our Christian faith. After all, I never feel so

uncomfortable as when the Holy Spirit sticks her nose into my life and asks me to let go of my comfort, my wants, and my way of life to follow the way of someone else—Jesus the Christ.

May we all be called to "live into the discomfort" of this Easter season.

PARTNERSHIP SPOTLIGHT

ELCA World Hunger Program

We give thanks to God for the partnership of the ELCA World Hunger program! This year, we applied for and received a 3-year grant (2019-2021) from the ELCA World Hunger program to fund the salary of our Sunday morning social worker, Jeff Jirak, as well as fund up to four Sundays of pancake breakfast groceries. In 2019, the ELCA World Hunger program awarded small grants to 77 congregations of the ELCA for programs that address local food insecurity. Each year of the grant, we will submit a review of the ministry and offer stories of how the pancake breakfast makes a difference in our community.

The ELCA World Hunger program works both domestically and internationally. Domestically, the program is manifest through congregations of the ELCA, including us. Individual congregations know best the needs of their own communities, so the program directs grant monies to projects within congregations. Internationally, ELCA World Hunger partners with many and various international church bodies, global mission personnel, and ecumenical partners to meet and build relationships with community leaders in communities large and small across the globe. The ELCA staff nurture relationships with these leaders who share with ELCA staff what they need or want in their community—since they know their community best. One of the most well- known aspects of the international program is "Good Gifts." Through Good Gifts, donors can purchase an animal or animal-related supplies like fencing, seeds for a garden, help provide a well, pay school fees for a child, educate people for skilled trades or to lead a congregation, and a variety of other sustainable hunger relief actions.
